"A timid six-year-old entered the program with her mom and younger, toddler brother. The staff watched as she picked up books from our Children's corner and read them in a corner by herself. On the third day of being at the shelter, she waited for the Family Devotional Time to start and before the staff began reading from the Children's Devotional the little girl asked if she could read. The staff guided her, and the entire group realized that this girl was an excellent reader. After that night our little girl read every night until they moved out. The shyness seemed to leave her."




